Vocabulary and Writing Exercises: gap-fill, categorising, matching, binary choice, writing sentences

Speaking Activities: asking and answering questions, making and responding to statements, freer practice (pair work)

Focus

Dealing with problems

Aim

To practice common phrases for identifying and clarifying problems.

Preparation

Make one copy of the two-page worksheet for each student.

Level

Upper-intermediate (B2)

Time

30 minutes

Introduction

In this dealing with problems worksheet, students practice common phrases for identifying and clarifying everyday problems.

Procedure

Give each student a copy of the two-page worksheet.

First, students discuss two questions about everyday problems in pairs.

Students then complete phrases that identify and clarify problems with words from a box and then indicate the function of each phrase.

Next, students match sentence halves to create statements related to identifying and clarifying problems.

After that, students underline the correct words to complete sentences and then match each statement identifying a problem to its corresponding clarification.

Students then use the language from the worksheet to write sentences identifying topic-related problems, e.g. for the topic 'home', students could write '*The challenge I need to address is* finding an apartment that is affordable but not too far from work.'

Finally, students take turns reading each sentence to a partner, who clarifies the issue, e.g. '*So, what you're saying is that* there aren't many affordable places near your office.'
